#### **Celebrate Teamwork**

My father started the third leg of his veterinary career on January 1, 1997. In helping organize the new office, my mother, who for years I have affectionately called "Socrates" for her ability to come up with philosophical phrases, came across this saying: Teamwork is the ability to work together toward a common vision: the ability to direct individual accomplishment toward organizational objectives. It is the fuel that allows common people to attain uncommon results. I took this statement, made a photocopy and tacked it to the wall facing my desk at the camp office. I was unsure when of where this statement would prove applicable, but was convinced that its message was both meaningful and useful. In the back of my mind I was thinking it would be great for pre-camp. This message conveyed the importance of building a successful team in order to provide the best service possible to our families.

On Thursday January 16, I was reflecting upon the last two weeks of camp fair shows. I came to the realization that in our unique environment, we actually work together as a team. The longer I'm involved with the Canadian camping community, the more I understand that the orgnization plays a vital role in bringing campers to all camps. A camp fair represents a microcosm of the much larger activity that evolves around our community. Within the confines of one room you can see the wide variety of camping experiences available to interested families. In this setting it is so refreshing to have other businesses support and help one another. On Tuesday and Wednesday nights a fellow camp director was kind enough to bring over two families to our booth. This director was very supportive and helpful with these families and took the time during busy shows to introduce these people to me. I was so impressed by this show of support to another camp. I am now quite certain that these kinds of occurrences happen all of the time at camp fairs, and throughout the course of the year. What is most impressive is that this is happening in an era when big businesses and governments are cutting back their services and giving citizens the feeling that everyone must look out for their own interests first. This is truly a unique and wonderful example of the invaluable role the camping community plays in maintaining the focus of what camping is all about. Our organizational goal through "teamwork" is creating a common vision. This common vision is to provide important information to families, giving them the freedom to make choices about the environment that best suits the needs and wants of the family. What I learned from watching my peers is that it is not important where a child goes to camp, but rather we can take pleasure knowing that a child is going to enjoy a wonderful camp experience. We must celebrate our "teamwork" and continue to set the example for others, most importantly for the young leaders of the future.

#### OCA SKILLS WEEKEND - JUNE 8-9, 1997

OCA Skills Weekend has a long-standing tradition of offering intensive, high-quality training for camp staff in specific programming areas. This year, the tradition continues on June 6-8, as YMCA Wanakita plays host to this year's exciting event.

The mandate of the weekend is threefold:

a) "To provide each participant with tools for continuous program development" - the weekend focuses not only on technical skill development but also on programming skills, in order to build confidence in enhancing the particular program area at each individual camp,

b) "A forum for exchange of information" - the weekend brings together an exciting mix of talented staff from across a broad spectrum of OCA camps, both as instructors and participants, and opportunities are built in for idea-sharing and exchange between all participants regardless of streams,

c) "An incentive to translate philosophy into safe, effective camping practices" - the experience is designed to motivate each participant to explore the potential of the particular program area, manage risk effectively, expand their repertoire of ideas, and match this with the philosophy and approach of their own particular camp.

Most participants attending have senior roles at their own camp, and would benefit from learning geared at a more advanced level. They register for one program "stream" and remain with that stream for the entire weekend. Individual camps are limited to sending two participants per stream, and thus, a wonderful crosssection of camping experiences is present. 1997 streams include: Canoeing Initiatives and Low Ropes Kayaking Boardsailing Outtripping Leadership Skills for Senior Staff

Integration Environmental Programming Program Potpourri Arts and Crafts

Our host site, YMCA Wanakita, provides a wonderful environment for the weekend. Located along the shores of Koshlong Lake in the Haliburton Highlands, Wanakita offers excellent program equipment and facilities for every stream, as well as comfortable cabins and great meals.

Now is a good time to start thinking about which staff to send from your camp. Camp Directors can expect to see specific benefits and contributions from their staff who participate, as well as a broader perspective on programming in the specific stream which they join.



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#### "WHITE PRIVILEGE"

Editor's Note: Liz Greenway (Camp Tapawingo) sent along the following list after taking part in a panel session at this year's conference dealing with multiculturalism in camping. The article it was taken from outlines the concept of "White Privilege" and how it impacts our daily life. Think about what skin colour privilege means to you as you ponder the list:

1. I can if I wish arrange to be in the company of people of my race most of the time.

2. If I should need to move, I can be pretty sure of renting or purchasing housing in an area which I can afford and in which I would want to live.

3. I can be pretty sure that my neighbours in such a location will be neutral or pleasant to me.

4. I can go shopping alone most of the time, pretty well assured that I will not be followed or harassed.

5. I can turn on the television or open to the front page of the paper and see people of my race widely represented.

6. When I am told about our national heritage or about "civilization," I am shown that people of my colour made it what it is.

7. I can be sure that my children will be given curricular materials that testify to the existence of their race.

8.If I want to, I can be pretty sure of finding a publisher for this piece on white privilege.

9. I can go into a music shop and count on finding the music of my race represented, into a supermarket and find that staple foods which fit with my cultural traditions, into a hairdresser's shop and find someone who can cut my hair.

10. Whether I use checks, credit cards, or cash, I can count on my skin colour not to work against the appearance of financial reliability.

11. I can arrange to protect my children most of the time from people who might not like them.

12. I can swear, or dress in second hand clothes, or not answer letters, without having people attribute these choices to the bad morals, the poverty, or the illiteracy of my race.

13. I can speak in public to a powerful male group without putting my race on trial.

14. I can do well in a challenging situation without being called a credit to my race.

15. I am never asked to speak for all the people of my racial group.

16. I can remain oblivious of the language and customs of persons of colour who constitute the world's majority without feeling in my culture any penalty for such oblivion.

17. I can criticize our government and talk abut how much I fear its policies and behaviour without being seen as a cultural outsider.

18. I can be pretty sure that if I ask to talk to "the person in charge," I will be facing a person of my race.

19. If a traffic cop pulls me over or if the IRS audits my tax return, I can be sure I haven't been singled out because of my race.

20. I can easily buy posters, postcards, picture books, greeting cards, dolls, toys, and children's magazines featuring people of my race.

21. I can go home from most meetings of organizations I belong to feeling somewhat tied in, rather than isolated, out of place, outnumbered, unheard, held at a distance, or feared.

22. I can take a job with an affirmative action employer without having co-workers on the job suspect that I got it because of race.


23. I can choose public accommodations without fearing that people of my race cannot get in or will be mistreated in the places I have chosen.

24. I can be sure that if I need legal or medical help, my race will not work against me.

25. If my day, week, or year is going badly, I need not ask of each negative episode or situation whether it has racial overtones.

26. I can choose blemish cover or bandages in "flesh" colour and have them more or less match my skin.


