LET'S
INTEGRATE
TOGETHER

In May of 1989 I conducted a survey of all OCA camps regarding their integration of special needs campers. To refresh your memory, the questions were: 1) Camp Name, 2) Residential or Day, 3) Which OCA Kindred Group do you associate with, 4) Whether you integrate, partially integrate, or do not integrate, 5) Cost, and 6) Do you offer a subsidy.

Forty-two Residential Camps and ten Day Camps responded as follows:

Question 4

18 integrate;

19 partially integrate;

10 do not integrate;

4 are camps for special needs campers only;
1 did not answer.

Question 6
22 offer subsidies;
24 do not offer subsidies;
6 did not answer.

As the results came to my office at Glenbrook, some thoughts came to mind. "What a lousy time to do a survey!" "I should have given more explanations to my questions". "I should have defined 'integration'". Possibly because of these errors, only 25% of the forms were returned.

It is difficult to draw conclusions from these statistics because of the low return, but some of my attitudes towards OCA camps were reinforced, none the less.

- 1) Camp Directors are busy people.
- 2) We are friendly and supportive folks, as noted by the kind words to me which were written on the returned forms.
- 3) Many camps are afraid to be labelled as the ones accepting children with special needs, because they don't want to be overwhelmed by requests from parents and agencies.
- 4) Directors need more education on the value of, and need for, accepting campers with special needs.

Starting with small numbers and increasing to a level that feels right seems to be a logical progression. If you are interested in this process, or would like to share your ideas, you have a chance at the OCA

Conference for Directors and Senior Staff on Saturday, January 27th. The session will be at the same time as some other dynamite sessions at 3:45 p.m. If it's not convenient to attend the workshop, give me a call and we could arrange a time to visit.

Children with special needs should have more choices when selecting a camp this summer.

THE GREEN SCENE

Welcome to The Green Scene. a new column of the OCAsional News! In the coming months we hope to give you some unique environmental programming ideas. updates on environmental issues facing camps, and advance notice of events happening throughout Ontario concerning the envi-Our ronment. first installment deals with one of many issues of waste management, Composting.

DID YOU KNOW? According to Environment Canada, nation generates the most waste per capita in the world! I wonder if that's because we have so much wilderness land that we somehow feel that there's lots of room out there for landfill? Well, there's lots we can do as rolemodels at camp to help the situation. One thing is to compost some of our food waste from the camp kitchen.

HOW? It's surprisingly First, discuss the easy! idea with your kitchen staff - they'll have to begin sorting their food scraps which would normally have gone in the garbage. Good scraps to start setting aside are eggshells, coffee grinds, fruit and vegetable peelings leftovers. These won't attract critters to your compost bin, and will reduce your production of kitchen garbage by impressive amount! Also, don't forget about raked leaves and grass, which are also excellent composting material.

Next, after discussing the idea with the rest of your staff, go ahead and build a bin. Since if you're careful your compost should not smell, find an open spot near the dining hall where kids and kitchen staff alike can get to easily, and where it's away from the lake or river. There are many bin designs from which to choose, and they're all very easy and inexpensive to make.

When you start to use the bin, put a layer of organic material in the bottom. Add a layer of earth and moisten. Then, keep on layering kitchen waste, yard waste and earth until the bin is full. Keep it moist if it's one of those dry summers that we've been having, and leave the full pile for about a month while you work on filling the next one!

Finally, design a program that gets the campers involved. Taking the material to the bin, turning and munching it with shovels is a great learning experience, and it's fun!

Remember, when you start composting, you will be reducing the amount of

garbage you throw away by 25%!!!
