ear Journal:

October may be the time of losing leaves but it is certainly the time for gaining momentum. Thanks to the OCA Editorial Committee of the *OCAsional News*, the September issue of our newsletter is now an annual kick start to the membership's year round commitment to quality camping. The minutes and work of many committees have indicated a great building of energy and the October 25th Advisory Council meeting confirmed it.

When the current structure of the Association was established, the Advisory Council was intended to provide a thrice annual link of all committees and task forces with the Board in order to provide for three functions: <u>face to face contact</u>; <u>focus</u>; and <u>forum</u>.

It was great to see new <u>faces</u> amongst some of the wily veterans. In some cases, it marks a healthy turnover of leadership amongst volunteers. In other cases, it marks a healthy distinction of roles between volunteers wearing two hats - those of directors on the Board and Chair of the committee(s) they are representing at the Board level.

The <u>focus</u> is now also a filter - the filter of our Action Plan. It has been very worthwhile to hold up the Action Plan to the minutes and projections of all of our efforts to test the role of the committees and task forces against this Association - wide target. What is the role of the OCA Code of Ethics? What is our overall professional development strategy? What is the role and responsibility of OCA Regionalism. These discussions were great and the entire Association can expect action resulting from them.

One more time Caryl Colton has stepped forward with just the right energy and enthusiasm around a key project. The addition of the membership survey to our membership renewal package has generated a wealth of information. Caryl summarized all of that information and we can now share it back with the membership in future issues of the *OCAsional News*.

I loved examining it at the Advisory Council Meeting (It was like having a 200-member Advisory Council(!)

What a great boon it has been to have Mary Lynn as part of the changes of the past few years. What a great loss it is to see her go. "Pepper" certainly spiced up the OCA. It was great watching this 'non-camper' gain more and more comfort with the Association - contributing thoughtful suggestions, diligent effort and special skills directly to her work but also to help the work of others.

Aboriginal culture shared with educators

he eagles soared at the Frost Centre Sept. 22-24, and boy did we fly.

The flying occurred during Moving Forward, Together: An Aboriginal Awareness Workshop for Educators, sponsored by the Ministry of Natural Resources. Over the three days of the workshop, our aboriginal brothers and sisters from Manitoba to Akwesasne to Onyata-ka (Oneida) willingly shared their traditional teachings, their histories and their love for life and unity with 50 aboriginal and non-aboriginal workshop participants.

We learned of the power of the circle, putting everyone on an equal footing, the value put on listening as well as sharing. They taught us about the importance of woman in their cultures, the sanctity of birth, life and death, and the need for universal harmony. According to the Iroquois and the Ojibwa, the circle has four equal parts - red for the red people, yellow for the Asians, white for the white people, and black for those from Africa. The traditional teachings, values systems and people of each colour hold equal value and all four parts are required to complete the circle.

Not only were we told about traditional teachings, we were given the honour to participate in many important ceremonies. We danced, sang, and cleansed using sage

(called smudging). From sharing circles to sweat lodges, the participants and the speakers shared histories - both the positive and the negative aspects, visions for the future and open hearts, resulting in the opening of our eyes and the cleansing of our souls.

We were also reminded that First Nations people are everywhere and are struggling to balance the best of their traditional teachings with the best of western technology and lifestyles. First Nations people are traditional spiritual teachers, doctors, nurses, professors, mothers, fathers, sisters, brothers, sons, daughters.

Yes, First Nations people have been treated poorly through the policy of residential schooling, relocation of traditional lands and the banning of the use of their first languages. However, this weekend introduced me to people who have taken these experiences and are learning from them, are teaching others and sharing in order to make us all more receptive.

In the past, summer camps have taught many "Native" traditions and subjects. In general, this instruction has been framed in a very positive light. However, teaching about the traditional methods of hunting, gathering, living (i.e.teepees), are we not creating a problem as well? We, as educators need to teach that not all First N

Nations people live "traditionally", and that they are not so different from us.

By experiencing these ceremonies and teachings, I have gained a better understanding of the current struggles, and I have great respect for the beliefs of these cultures. The door has just been opened for me, the journey has just begun. By learning, experiencing and reading, we can only move forward, together!


