# REPORT TO THE MEMBERSHIP . . . FROM O.C.A. TASK FORCE SUCCESS WITH THE 1st ANNUAL O.C.A. CANOEING WEEKEND!! SUCCESS WITH THE 1st ANNUAL O.C.A. CAMP NURSES' CONFERENCE!!

Think back to the Spring of 1981 when a new Task Force of O.C.A. undertook two major pilot projects designed to meet specific needs of O.C.A. Camp Staff.

Here is a brief summary of the 2 events:

#### 1. O.C.A. CAMP NURSES' CONFERENCE

On Saturday, July 13, 1981, Forty-eight O.C.A. Camp Nurses arrived at Forest Valley Day Camp for our ist ever Nurses' Conference. Thirty O.C.A. Camps were represented, staff shared information, about health and safety procedures at Camp, the role of the Camp Nurse, camp sanitation and the treatment of illnesses, accidents and emergencies (among others!) Dr. Jim Fallis, the Director of Emergency Services at the Hospital for Sick Children and former camp doctor at an O.C.A. member camp conducted the major portion of the Conference. Dr. Fallis' warm personality set the tone for a terrific day of sharing between delegates.

Mrs.: Mary Casey, author of The Nurse and The Health Program at Camp, was the principal organizer of the day's events, and my thanks are extended to her for her hard work and dedication.

Thanks are also due to Bert Fine, Director of Forest Valley Day Camp, for the use of his camp facility - it was a perfect setting for us.

Evaluations of the Conference were all positive! Everyone agreed that the event a) long overdue, b) most informative, c) a lot of fun and d) needed again!

#### 2. O.C.A. Canoeing Weekend

June II - 14, 1981 marked the beginning of our O.C.A. skill development programs for staff. Our canoeing workshop was held at Glen Bernard Camp, with John Jorgenson of Camp Tawingo and Bryan Dumouchel of Camp Tawingo providing leadership

The 3 day event took delegates through the basics of setting up a safe camp canoeing program. Areas covered included -

- 1. philosophy and objectives of camp canoeing
- 2. skill progressions
- 3. teaching progressions
- 4. history and resources
- 5. canoeing safety and waterfront set-up.

'Think and Discuss' sessions were interspersed with 'Heard and Do' activities - social recreation programs enabled the group to become a single unit designed to benefit our campers through their canoeing experiences.

Perhaps the best evaluation of the course can be summed up with exerpts from a letter received by one of the delegates:

"Reflecting back on my experiences as Canoe Instructor and Tripper, I have only positive feelings toward the O.C.A. Canoe Weekend!

'After taking the course I felt not only a great improvement in my skills but also motivation to learn much more about canoeing, tripping and woodsmanship.'

'I would highly recommend this course to anyone considering a position of a canoeing skill staff. I found everything that was covered to be important, useful and interesting. The leadership was fantastic and the camp spirit was something that stayed with me right through the summer."

This first ever Canoe Course was run on the basis of encouragement from member camps who indicated a real need for programs of this type. Although the registration numbers did not reflect the anticipated support, I do feel the program was a tremendous success. The positive comments from the participants exemplify the importance of such an experience, and we are looking forward to greater participation in our 1982 program.

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#### A MESSAGE FROM ST. JOHN AMBULANCE

The number of camps using St. John Ambulance First Aid courses grew last summer because camp operators are realizing it's a bonus in more ways than one.

Randy McMahon says parents and campers told him it was an asset in the camp program. He is residential camp director of the Boy Scout's Camp Samac in Oshawa.

"The campers thoroughly enjoyed the Lifesaver course, took great pride in passing, and the parents I spoke to were impressed that a program such as this was offered at our Camp."

Laurent Filiatrault uses St.John courses to teach French as well as first aid. He's director of L'Auberge des Pionniers in Mattawa, which offers French immersion and outdoor education as well as the customary camp activities.

"I think the first aid and safety training is a plus for campers, and when they go home they can use it, and they can use it at school."

He says the St. John teaching approach, combining film, instruction and practice, works for teaching both language and First Aid.

"When they see someone doing first aid and talking about it, then when they do it, they learn, and they don't forget it. And at our camp, they're also learning another type of vocabulary in French".

St. John courses are taught with an emphasis on safety and accident prevention, and can be related directly to accidents that could happen at camps, on wilderness trips, anywhere outdoors.

The courses complement other outdoor safety and skill training for staff, counsellors and campers.

Training can be arranged in several ways. Staff and instructors can take courses in their home communities during the winter. If the camp has a Workmen's Compensation Board number, some of them can be trained at WCB expense. St. John can also arrange training at pre-camp sessions and during camp. Camps may also have someone on the staff trained as a St. John instructor to conduct training at the camp's convenience. This is the option taken by many businesses and industries.
